Eli's Happy Ending

When our son, Elijah, was 17-months old he suffered from a sudden and massive brain bleed. The swelling of his brain caused a severe stroke leading to prolonged seizure after seizure. All of this had happened at his daycare where he completely lost all vital signs and 911 was called in order to get him to the closest hospital as soon as possible. He was taken into Emergency at Four Counties Health Services. We are so blessed to have a community hospital within 15 minutes of our town.

As soon as Eli arrived, the staff sprang into action and began assessing his situation. They asked many questions and probed to get more details to try and determine what had happened. It was immediately decided that he needed to get to London Children's Hospital so that proper scans of his brain could be conducted. They tried to arrange a helicopter transfer for Eli, but the weather was too snowy and blustery that day so they began trying to organize the next best mode of ground transport for him. Once they had the team arranged to get him to London, they were exceptionally diligent in stabilizing him the best they could for the transfer. Because he kept slipping into seizures it was extremely difficult to get him stabilized and the staff took the time necessary to make sure every aspect was taken into consideration. The entire time, all involved kept coming up with possible scenarios and solutions and he was given many medications as a precaution to ensure that all the bases were covered. Every single person involved in the entire process with Eli absolutely did the best they could given the circumstances with the means and the knowledge they had. Their quick action and vast knowledge surely saved our son's life that day!

Aside from being impressive medically-speaking, everyone involved in this process at Four Counties General Hospital showed absolute compassion towards our family. They were all there offering as much information as they could, coupled with a lot of support. Probably the most vivid memory that stands out in Omar's mind is the encouragement that they gave for him to talk to Eli and hold his hand. Even though Eli was unconscious and hooked up to many wires, tubes and machines and we had no diagnosis on how severe any potential brain damage may be, they just kept reminding Omar how important it was to let him hear his Daddy's voice and feel his touch. This advice was accepted graciously because in a situation like this, a parent feels so helpless and this was a way that we could feel like we were doing something to help our child! After the transport to London Children's Hospital, Eli underwent major brain surgery and was in a sedated coma for the first five days. And through that entire process, we took the advice that we had received from the Four Counties staff in those first few hours and talked the whole time to our son to let him know how much he was loved and that we were right there at his side

The staff at Four Counties Health Services followed Eli's progress long after he left their Emergency room, especially one nurse, Doris-Marie Smith. She would read Eli's daily blog for updates and even attended his "Welcome Home" Open House celebration six months later when Eli's hospital and rehabilitation journey finally brought all of us back home to live as a family again. Doris-Marie brought a little toy helicopter for Eli as a reminder of the ride that they had all worked so very hard to try and arrange for him that day! Our family still pops in for visits to the Emergency room at Four Counties every now and again. We are well aware that all tragic situations may not turn out as positive as ours did and we want to do our part in showing medical staff that there are truly happy endings to situations like this; the remarkable three-year-old boy that Eli has become today is proof of that! The magnitude of the genuine kindness that was shown to us in the Four Counties Emergency room as well as during our journey afterwards is still overwhelming to our family even to this day.


Catherine currently teaches internationally educated nurses at Fanshawe College. Her hobbies are swimming, skiing and travel.

Lifecall has a two-way voice communication base unit that acts as a speaker phone in case the person cannot get to the phone due to an injury etc. Lifecall also has a built in handy medication reminder. Installation is free to our community members.
